Equality Objective 1	To improve outcomes for Pupil Premium particularly in maths at the end of KS2
Why	To diminish the difference in attainment between our disadvantaged and non-disadvantaged pupils in maths
How	Interventions with PP and LAC children in addition to quality first teaching – TAs allocated by Head teacher where the need is thr highest Use Pupils attitudes to school and self (PASS) to analyse attitudes towards school and use as a baseline for action planning, and interventions during Monday assembly. Class teachers to build relationships and improve communication with parents of children in receipt of Pupil Premium funding through the following: targeted conversations, positive feedback and proactive intervention e.g. invites to meet the teacher. Development of disadvantaged tracker to better support targeting of children. Disadvantaged action plans to include targets to be updated half termly. Provide additional swimming lessons for PP children not meeting the national standard. Maths mastery approach to be taught across the whole school. No longer setting in year 6. 3 rd Space maths intervention and pre teaching for identified pupils.
Expected Outcome	Attainment to improve for PP children in maths at the end of key stage 2.

Equality Objective 2	To rewrite the RSE curriculum to meet all the legal requirements ready for 2020
Why	The change in government expectations means that all pupils have to participate in RSE lessons. Parents to be informed of any resources we will be using to support the delivery.
How	Review current provision. Consult parents regarding the content of the new RSE curriculum.

	Link RSE with online safety. The new RSE curriculum supports the development of personal attributes including kindness, integrity, generosity, and honesty towards each other.
Expected Outcome	To ensure all children develop knowledge of healthy relationships.
