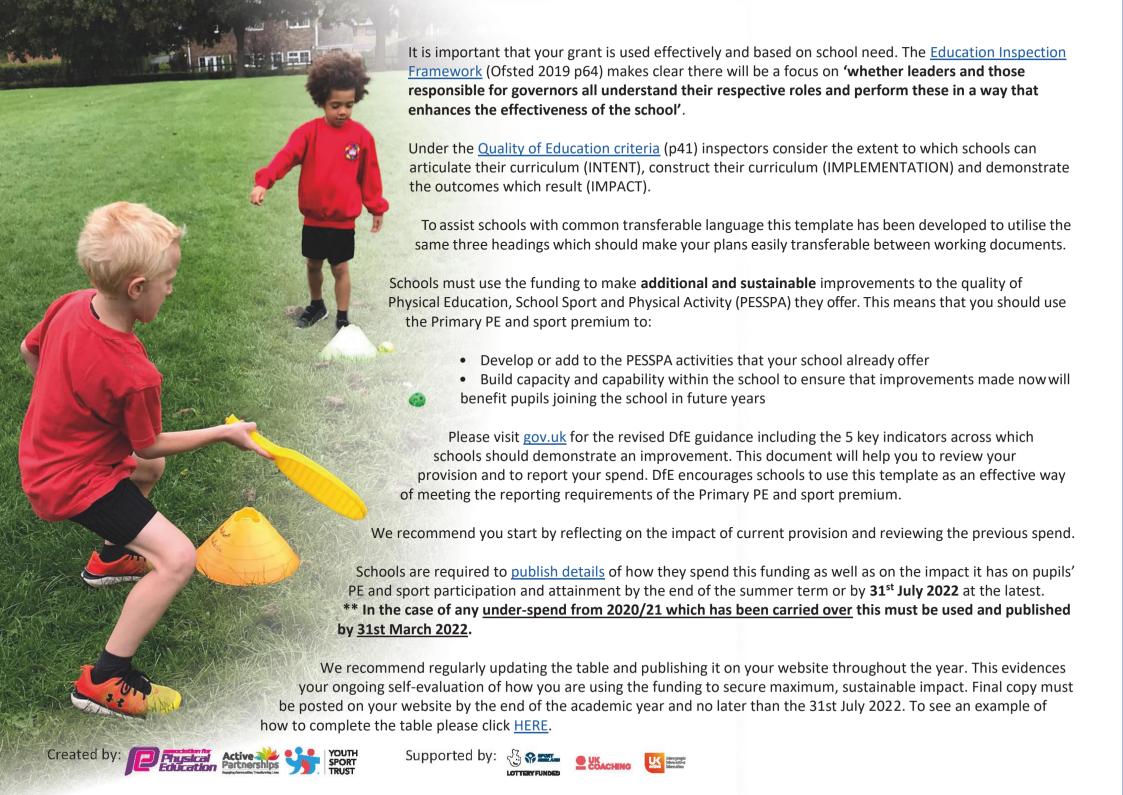

Key achievements to date:

- > The school continues to perform well in inter & intra-school competitions
- ➤ The school has signed up to the School Games programme and pupils are now starting to represent Lewisham across different sports in borough events.
- > Swimming skills and attainment are consistently above 85% for Year 6 pupils.
- There is a vastly improved access to physical play at lunchtimes and playtimes across the school through OPAL.
- ➤ PE curriculum has been reviewed and updated in KS1 to ensure that key skills are being taught progressively.
- ➤ PE curriculum has been reviewed and updated in KS2 to ensure that skills across a variety of sports are taught progressively.
- ➤ Pupils continue to engage very well with extra-curricular activities.
- Fairlawn has now achieved bronze status for Healthy Schools London and will explore steps towards silver status.

Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:

- Further develop the quality of gymnastics teaching across the school. The curriculum has been update school. Resources have been purchased to ensure progression across the school. Resources have been purchased to ensure that pupils are challenged within lessons. Looking at opportunities to support gymnastics CPD for teachers through School Games programme. Teachers now reflecting on the progress of pupils through a foundation subject assessment proforma.
- Improve links with local clubs and secondary schools for pupils who express an interest or show potential to develop a sport further.

 Recent links have been made with the Honor Oak Panthers Hockey Club and the Crystal Palace Atheries Club.
- Further improve pupils' health, fitness and wellbeing. Sugar display to been put up in school. 'Eat Then To Defeat Then' campaign was launched in June. We also took part in the London Mayor's competition to promote the importance of drinking water. We achieved bronze status for Healthy Schools London in Feb 2022
- To increase participation of disadvantaged pupils in extra-curricular activities. KS2 clubs have started again with six different clubs across the week. Disadvantaged pupils have received invites via phone. Clubs continue to be full with a focus continuing on disadvantaged pupils. Clubs have been extended to include KS1 in the summer term.
- To further develop the quality of dance teaching across the school. The curriculum has been updated to ensure progression across the school. Dance to be taught during Spring Land Summer L with teacher selecting some of their own dance themes to ensure cross-curricular links with topic learning.
